

# A THREE DAY SELF-DRIVE THROUGH TASMANIA'S WHISKEY MIDLANDS

There's a quiet kind of magic that lingers in Tasmania's Southern Midlands — a place where rolling hills are dotted with English-style villages, Georgian sandstone buildings, and age-old bridges built by convict hands. But there's also something decidedly modern brewing: the Tasmanian whisky trail is putting this region back on the map for reasons far beyond history.

#### Day 1 – Launceston to Ross

Start your journey in **Launceston** and make your way south along the *Midlands Highway* toward the village of **Campbell Town**. Your first stop is **Adams Distillery** in Perth, a family-run operation crafting award-winning Tasmanian whisky.

In Campbell Town, walk across the **1838 Red Bridge**, built with over 1.5 million bricks. Visit **Coco Blue** for homewares and café delights, and browse **The Book Cellar** inside an 1830s coaching inn. Don't miss the **Campbell Town Museum** for colonial and wool industry insights.

Head south to **Ross**, a stunning Georgian village. Explore the **Ross Bridge**, carved by convicts in 1836, and visit the **Ross Female Factory** – one of Australia's most complete convict women's sites. Then visit the **Tasmanian Wool Centre** to discover local merino wool history.

Overnight in Ross: Budget: Ross B&B Accommodation Upmarket: Shepherds Story

## Day 2 – Ross to Oatlands

Begin your morning wandering Ross and lifting the handset on the red phone boxes to hear historical stories.

Drive to **Oatlands** and explore the **Callington Mill Distillery**, a beautifully restored flour mill turned whisky destination. Join a tasting session or enjoy a meal on-site.

Stretch your legs around Lake Dulverton, home to many bird species and the quirky *Cows in the Lake* sculpture.

Shop for chocolates and preserves at **Tidbit and Morsel**, browse handmade textiles at **The Weaver's Cottage Studio**, and admire antiques at **The Jardin Room & Provincial Interiors**. Grab a hearty dinner at the **Kentish Hotel**.

## Day 3 – Oatlands to Kempton

Depart Oatlands and stop in **Pontville** to visit **Lark Distillery Pontville Estate**. Explore its historic grounds, cellar door and whisky bar.

Your final destination is **Old Kempton Distillery** in Kempton. Set in the grand 1842 Dysart House, it's a fitting conclusion with guided tastings, quality spirits and a top-tier café.

Optional overnight in or near Kempton: Budget: Brighton Hotel Motel Upmarket: Harmony Hill Wellness and Organic Spa Retreat (in nearby Margate)

## Practical information

- Best time to visit: March to May for crisp air and autumn colours. August is ideal for Tasmanian Whisky Week events across the state.
- Opening hours: Most distilleries and galleries are open 10am–4pm. Always check ahead for seasonal hours or tour bookings.
- Dress code: Casual and layered even in summer, evenings can be chilly. Closed shoes recommended for distillery tours and outdoor walks.
